- I. Loyalty/Honor: Doing What is Right Regardless of Circumstances (and whether anyone sees)
 - A. What are some biblical examples of God's people showing loyalty/honor?
 - B. In What Ways do we see Characters from the LOTR showing loyalty/honor?
 - Sam always loyal to Frodo, becomes inadvertent hero
 - Eowyn's duty and loyalty to Theoden
 - Aragorn's loyalty to Arwen, despite affections of Eowyn
 - Aragorn was protecting the Shire secretly, even as he is mocked by likes of Butterbur
 - Counter Examples in LOTR:
 - Boromir betraying the mission of the Fellowship
 - o Saruman secretly plotting with Sauron, lusting for power
 - o Wormtongue lying and deceiving

 - Lucy and Susan before Aslan dies
- II. Courage/Bravery: Doing What is Right in the Midst of Great Fear or Great Enemies

- Merry going to battle, fighting Nazgul on the Pelennor fields
- The charge of the Rohirrim
